


Keith Jeans

The Seasons Sneak Up On Me

very year the wet season is followed by the dry. OK, some wet seasons are wetter than others and some dry seasons are shorter than others. BUNT President's Update

L et me share with you some of the things that have taken place over the last few months.

Visit to the Indigenous Churches

Firstly, back in April, I along with Viv Grice (from Global Interaction), travelled out to visit the Baptist churches at Lajamanu, Kalkarindji / Daguragu and then on to the Katherine Warlpiri Baptist Church. I always love meeting up with my brothers and sister in the LORD, and I trust that they too are blessed as we seek to cheer each other on in our faith in Jesus. The week before this, several representatives from Global Interaction (based in Melbourne) traveled up to the southern indigenous churches. Again, meeting with church leaders and building bridges is so important. I can also now report that Danny and Beth Hunt, from New Hope Baptist Church in Melbourne, have been accepted as Global Interaction candidates to join the team in Central Australia, and will be working alongside church leaders and the Andersons. The details of where they will be based and what this will look like are yet to be worked out.

Katherine Baptist Church

For the last seven years Ernie Mitchell has served as pastor of Katherine Baptist Church, and in more recent time Ernie's wife, Alice, has undertaken an administrative role in the church. Well, this season is now coming to an end, as they have made the decision to retire and relocate to be near the grandchildren. I wish to thank them both for their service to the LORD in Katherine. and on behalf of the family of Baptist churches in the Territory, I wish every blessing as they transition into this new season. Please be in prayer for Katherine Baptist Church as they seek to explore what this next season will look like for them.

Possible Amalgamation

The Assembly was made aware, some time ago, of the Board's exploration of a possible amalgamation of the Baptist Union of the Northern Territory with the Baptist Churches of South Australia. This has been something that has been raised from time to time over a number of years; however in more recent times, the participation in the National Redress Scheme and increased compliance in other areas has expedited this further. l wish to provide an update as to where we are at in this process. On the 27th March this year the Board set time aside to pray and wrestle with the implications, benefits, and losses associated with such an amalgamation. This was an open and honest conversation where different views were aired, including legitimate concerns but also perceived benefits.

This time concluded with an unanimous decision to officially write to the Board of the Baptist Churches of South Australia to express our desire to have them explore this further with us. This letter was duly sent, and we have received a response in which the Board of BCSA has expressed a desire to explore further what this could look like. Please pray for us in this process and we will keep you informed of any developments as they arise.

The Big Picture

As I close, I would like to remind you that your church is one of 12 Baptist churches in the Northern Territory, and one of one about a 1000 Baptist Churches in Australia, and one of around 169,000 Baptist Churches worldwide. That is one big family! Thanks for being part of it.

Almost all remote communities are connected to a local art centre, and so employment outcomes are also very strong. The NT government got on board with the vision and the first art course at Nungalinya since the early 2000s could begin!' The course is led by trainers, Sal Moes and Kerry McCarthy, herself a local Indigenous artist.

In May the second Art and Faith Course for this year was held. Four people from Yuendumu Baptist came to take part. Church Leaders, **Eddie and Lottie Roberston with Lorraine and Lavinia** were eager to learn about using their art and loved the course. They and other students created some amazing pieces of art using the Psalms as their lens to depict God's Creation

A real highlight of the month was the Chapel service led by the '**Art and Faith**' class. Lottie opened the service with prayer and the students showcased their art works and shared through word, song and dance their growth in trusting our great

God.

The Easter Purlapa (Corroboree) was performed on Saturday night. Boys and girls played the parts of Bible characters and acted out the story while it was being read from the Bible and sung in the traditional Warlpiri style.

On Easter Sunday there was a large gathering at church. Mat and Shannon tell of the mighty blessings as six baptisms and several baby dedications were celebrated together with the large group who came from Lajamanu and Willowra to share Easter with Yuendumu.

Planning is currently underway for Yangbala Kemp (July) and Bush Camp (October). These camps are aimed at Indigenous children and youth from the Central Arnhem communities. Katherine Christian Convention For 50 years, SU has assisted KCC by running a Children's Program during the main adult teaching sessions. This helps parents attending the convention. KCC is held on the long weekend in May, and 30-40 kids attended each of the 4 sessions over the weekend. A highlight was the performance of the memory verse on the Sunday night in both English and Kriol (with actions).

Religious Instruction in Schools David Pohlmann is School Ministry Coordinator for SU. 15 volunteer RI teachers, as well as two SU staff Members, teach in 10 Darwin primary schools. 
Birth of a Bush Church



Murray Downs cattle station lies about 30 km east of Ali Curung. Alyawarra people have been living there for many years. Members of the Ali Curung church faithfully made regular trips to Murray Downs to share their faith, yet after 25 years there were no believers. Communication was a huge problem, as very few Alyawarra spoke English, and none of the Ali Curung people spoke much Alyawarra.

But God had the answer! In 1980, an Alyawarra man named Donald Kamarra, who had been living in Tennant Creek, approached the missionary at Ali Curung and with broken English shared that he wanted to give his life to Jesus. His wife was a Christian, and she had been witnessing to him for some time. Donald wanted the Lord to come into his life and make him a new man, and so powerful was the change the Lord made in Donald that he had a strong desire to go to Murray Downs and share his testimony. "They are all my family, my language group, and I want them to know."

Donald visited a number of times, and each time the response was amazing! Through his preaching many people responded and gave their lives to Jesus. Next came the baptisms: 18 in the first group, followed by others. The believers met together each night for some months, with the Ali Curung church folk continuing to visit and encourage the new believers.

After some teaching on the nature of the Church, the Murray Downs group chose some leaders, and was constituted as a church, joining the Baptist Family of Churches in the NT in 1981.

After some years, numbers in the church began to decrease as people started returning to their homelands.

A few faithful folk still live there, and meet whenever they can.

Staying in business during a Pandemic

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit Deborah's community in rural Kenya, the stakes were already high. Deborah's thriving business saw its sales plummet and she was at risk of returning to a very precarious livelihood: subsistence farming in an area prone to drought and known for its low crop yields.

At Baptist World Aid Australia, we're grateful for the support of DFAT's Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP). Partnership with ANCP has helped communities like Deborah's weather the COVID pandemic in inspiring ways.

The pandemic continues to have devastating effects on poor communities around our world but with the support of Baptist World Aid Australia's Christian partner in Kenya, Deborah's community is now flourishing.

As a mother of three children, Deborah has always worked hard but it has been a struggle to make a living. Then, Deborah joined a self-help group supported by Baptist World Aid's Christian partner.





These groups meet to receive training in savings and loan management, microfinance literacy, agricultural and business skills as well as good hygiene practices.

The program helped Deborah access a low interest loan to open a shop, purchase stock items and begin trading. 'Within the first month [of trading] I started repaying the loan without challenges' Deborah said. Business was going well until COVID hit. Shutdowns led to a drastic drop in income. Repaying loans was difficult and meetings had to be suspended. For communities like Deborah's, the return to a precarious life of poverty seemed likely.

Fortunately, in August, the group resumed meeting. Baptist World Aid's partner provided training in soap making and Deborah immediately saw the opportunity.

The demand for soap was high, as it has been everywhere, and required little capital to kickstart the new business. Deborah has been able to sell to individuals in her community as well as the local hospital, schools, and local government offices. Deborah has a vision to increase her production and attain the certification needed to sell her soap to major outlets.

She is thankful to have been able to support her family through a challenging time and help protect her community. Deborah is, 'praying [for] God to reward abundantly all people who have helped me grow my business to where it is now.'

G od's word has been translated into the Anmatyerr language! Anmatyerr people live in Central Australia, the population of around 1000 are spread among ten or so communities. David and Ming Fang Strickland (from Wycliffe/SIL) have been involved in this project for 18 years.

In 2021 they celebrated the newly published Anmatyerr Mini-Bible at four different locations spaced out over four different months. These launch events were held as part of communion services at Ti Tree, Alice Springs Lutheran Church, Laramba and Mt. Allan. For each event there were visitors from churches in Alice Springs, even one from interstate! They came with lots of food and goodies to share with our Anmatyerr brothers and sisters. Many wonderful conversations happened!

Ming Fang prepared a banner with photos illustrating the story of the 18 years ministry. This was hung in the various locations and attracted a lot of interest among the Indigenous folk, especially when their relatives were pictured!



For each celebration, we ordered a cake iced with an image of the Mini Bible. The cakes were a great success with the people. Despite bringing them some 2-3 hours, sometimes over bumpy dirt roads, they all made it to the destinations intact! During these dedications we received some very positive feedback. The most exciting thing was that several asked us to visit and teach them God's word.

At a recent Bible study in Ti Tree one lady said that hearing God's words in her own language just made her feel so happy, even the happiest time in her life! She thanked God, for her father and uncles who helped with the translation. Now she can hear God's words so clearly. This will be our future plan—to do more Bible translation and Bible studies with Anmatyerr people!

"I like to make the fairy bread because I get to eat it after." Naomi (4 years).

"Looking after the little kids and working in creche is my favourite thing to do on Super Service Sundays. Sometimes I read the bible in church, but I don't enjoy it as much as creche." Amy (11 years).

It is such a joy to see the children working with all their hearts, as though working for the Lord and not for men (Colossians 3:23).



Unmasking



Today's world is dominated by masks. Masks create a shield to what is underneath and protect from outside forces. Invisibility can result and unmasking can occur at different levels.

As we get to know the intercultural workers supported by our churches, we learn much about their faith journey, their issues and their passions. This has occurred with Baptist Churches SA/NT supporting three new workers, who are focusing on contexts in SE Asia and the Silk Road, respectively, involved with community development management and TESOL. Whilst personal connection is vital, it is especially difficult with the workers God has called to security conscious situations, as public exposure is limited.

Intercultural workers need to form deeper connections through learning language and culture, as with David and Susie Haydon making progress with learning Ciwayo in Malawi; and Rob and **Deb Griffith** learning about the Khmer end of wet season festival (Bon Om Touk) that involves boat racing, releasing prayer floats and the full moon remembrance of a story of a pre-incarnation of Buddha. I saw the importance of connection recently through participating in Mission Interlink's T-TRIM workshop, 'Living in Two Worlds', in Darwin, for those engaging with first nation peoples.

Thank you to everybody who provided opportunity and hospitality during my visit to the Northern Territory in April, which proved valuable in discovering more about the context there.

ost will agree that foundations are important in both lives and churches, physically and spiritually, which is the whole point of Jesus' parable of the house built on either sand or rock.


At a members meeting on Sunday 11 April, CrossRoads membership voted almost unanimously to adopt a new, leader-led model, constitution. For me (Bruce) this has been a journey of about five years from the time I first realised the direction in which we were being led and the need to restructure. At the time, I thought it was to happen reasonably quickly but I came to see that was not the case. God's idea of 're-structure' was much bigger than mine, hence the five year process. Now in place it will, no doubt, take a little time to get everything happening the way we've agreed, but that's all part of the challenge of 'building on rock'.

On a different note, on the first Saturday Pastor Bruce Clow of each month during the dry we have a small team taking the Baptist Care NT **BBQ to Sanctuary Lakes** and giving away sausages and onions on bread. A couple of our 'born evangelists' walk around the area doing what evangelists do while others ordinarily chat to passers-by. Often the question of 'why are you doing this?' comes up, providing a real opportunity for conversation. ... the fields are white unto harvest...

A couple of weeks back, while out walking, I was stopped by a distraught lady on a mobility scooter – she had lost her phone, 'Have you found it – it's my lifeline?'. After trying the number a couple of times with no joy, she gladly accepted my offer of prayer. Four days later we had a timely 'crossing of paths' at the supermarket; while grasping my hand firmly with both hers, she enthusiastically told me her errant phone had been handed in to the Supermarket desk '...14 minutes after you prayed...'. She then went on, asking if I would come and meet her friends at an art class during the week.

For very good reason, that was to be my first art class since 1969. Having been at the class for less than 10 minutes, an older man asked if I could sit with him. he had a question: 'What happens when I die?' What an awesome opportunity to share the message of Christ.

Steve Swartz and his wife Bev came to Australia in 1977 as members of Wycliffe Bible Translators. They lived and worked among the Warlpiri people at the remote community of Lajamanu, Northern Territory from 1978-1986. They and their three children moved to Alice Springs in 1989 where Steve and his wife now live in semi-retirement.

What is it like for a young man from small-town Ohio to answer the call of God into mission work? What family, church and educational influences shaped this man into what he became?

Together, from the early 80s until the present day, Steve and Bev Swartz have survived his mental health frailties manifesting as suicidal depression and bipolar disorder. Even now, it's one day at a time.

In **Broken Pot**, this powerful memoir informs, educates, entertains and challenges the readers to not give up on what God has started. Moreover, it is sincerely hoped that fellow-sufferers of the Black Dog and other forms of mental illness will come to realise that God has not abandoned them; that He can still use *cracked pots* to accomplish His purposes and that there is help for them even in the darkness.
