aster is fast approaching. I realise that you may have plans for this Easter season. I wonder if those plans include some stillness, some contemplation and reflection? Sometimes I like to find a quiet place and contemplate life. Maybe there is a significant place that you go to, either in your home or maybe in the beauty of the natural environment, that special camping spot. In the last chapter of Matthew's Gospel, we find this statement,

"After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb."

I wonder if they just wanted to sit by the tomb and quietly contemplate all the events that they had witnessed. I wonder if they just wanted to sit by the tomb and share with one another some of the things that Jesus had said to them before his death. I wonder if they just wanted to be silently thoughtful, not even speaking a word to each other, just sitting, just being.

If that is what they were planning, it certainly is not what took place. No, there is a 'violent earthquake' and a messenger from heaven 'rolled back the



stone and sat on it'. From here the angel speaks to the women,

"Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.'"

It goes on to say that the women left, 'afraid yet filled with joy' (Matthew 28:8). Every Easter I am attracted, like some sort of magnetic force to those five words, 'afraid yet filled with joy'.

The very next voice they hear is that of Jesus himself, saying "Greetings, do not be afraid...." (Matthew 28:9-10)

May Jesus disrupt your life this Easter, and may He bring joy!

Mat and Shannon Anderson Our Outback Team





A rare visit to the beach for Mat, Shannon, Beth, Peter, Caleb and Samuel

As the pandemic challenges of 2020 continue, Mat and Shannon Anderson, together with their four children, continue to be the core of the Outback Team, ministering at Yuendumu, while travelling to other communities as they have opportunity.

Mat recently reported a couple of encouraging conversations. The first was with some of the young adult males in the community in the wake of a very difficult incident that occurred near their home.

The needs of young people in remote communities are often great, resulting sometimes in behaviours that are less than ideal. However, Mat and Shannon seek to engage positively even when those behaviours sometimes impact them negatively. We are wise to remember that the Lord is with us in such times, something Mat would attest to.

The second conversation involved the young grandchildren of a godly Christian lady. They spoke with Mat about wanting to know about Jesus, for they saw in their grandmother, and heard in her stories about Jesus, something that made them curious about faith.

She is obviously a very positive influence on these young lives. It is a great reminder that we too, can influence others by what we say and do, either towards Christ or away from Him.

Another positive that we would ask readers of *Belonging People* to pray about, is a very early, but promising conversation with other individuals considering whether God might be calling them to join the Outback Team. Two of them are a very experienced ministry couple with existing links to Central Australia. While this is a very early part of a longer process of discernment, it is of great encouragement to know that God might be bringing in other workers to stand alongside Mat and Shannon.

Finally, with border restrictions easing, Viv Grice, the Outback Team Leader, is planning to visit Darwin and some of the northern communities with Mal Good just after Easter, connecting with members of the Indigenous Taskforce that aims to help strengthen and grow connections between BUNT churches, Global Interaction, National Baptist Ministries, and our indigenous brothers and sisters.

We would ask that you pray that these plans would be able to be implemented, especially in light of the ever-changing travel situations posed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

It is an encouragement for the Global Interaction team partnering with BUNT churches. We thank you for your interest, support and prayers.

Giving Thanks for the Ministry of John and Jan Whitbourn

In November 2020, John Whitbourn officially retired as Associate Pastor at Casuarina Church. In a moving tribute, during the Worship service, Peter Kent expressed the gratitude of the church family for John and his wife Jan.

John and Jan Whitbourn were known to Casuarina Baptist Church many years before they joined us and shared ministry here. We knew them through their mission work amongst our Baptist indigenous brothers and sisters and through their ministry at Palmerston Baptist Church.

John and Jan – team Whitbourn - are a great team, and though John has been the one with the official roles, Jan has been a tower of strength and support throughout. We love and appreciate you both so much.

In May 2007, CBC needed an interim pastor. We asked John and Jan to come and help us for a "6 month" interim at CBC....in fact this interim extended for 2 years.

During the two-year interim, John assisted the church to work through the process of finding a new pastor who was appointed in 2009. The church so much appreciated and valued John's ministry that we asked him to continue as Associate Pastor. John chose not to seek a stipend from the church and became Honorary (unpaid) Associate Pastor.

Also, around this time, the church was reaching out to support refugees settling in Australia, including many of our Karen folk and also to others from various countries in the detention centres. John's many years of experience in crosscultural ministry now fitted him so well to work with the refugees and he took to this role with passion and dedication.

Many of these people were hungry to explore faith in God, now that they were in a country that allowed them to do so, and John spent countless hours visiting and sharing the Gospel with them and baptised many at their request. Many are still in contact and still walking and growing in faith, thanks to John's work with them.

In 2011, and again in 2016 when a pastor left, John once more took on the responsibility of interim pastor. How blessed we were to have him shepherd our congregation through times of change such as this – providing a stability and continuity of immense value to the church.

John's ministry enabled CBC to continue to grow and reach out, to really be the church, rather than just marking time.

Several years ago, John fought a battle with cancer, which the Lord mercifully enabled him to win, all the while continuing to serve, and never drawing attention to his situation.

It has now been 13 and a half years that John and Jan have been with us and we have been immeasurably blessed by the tireless, humble, wise and Godly service they have done together amongst us and amongst others here in the Territory and from all over the world who were in need of the Gospel.

John and Jan......have been the Lord's amazing provision for all of these times.

Casuarina Church gives God the glory for who you are and all that you have done in His name. Bless you both!

Meeting the Needs of **Vulnerable Territorians**





aptist Care NT (BCNT), through packed and distributed was 1580. the ministry of Foodbank NT and Food For Life, continues to grow and expand to meet the increasing demands of feeding vulnerable Territorians. For example, in the lead up to Christmas 2019, the number of Christmas Hampers packed andistributed totalled 464. Compared to the lead up to Christmas 2020, the number of Christmas Hampers

This significant increase is reflective of the increase in demand BCNT has seen for food during the Covid Pandemic.

A second example is that at the height of the crisis in the last quarter of the last financial year, demand was up by 61%, the equivalent of an additional 86,000 meals leaving the warehouse during that three-month period.

I want to acknowledge the incredible generosity of the NT **Government, our Corporate and** Individual Donors – without whom we would not have been able to meet the extra demand.

Even in the Dark Places

with Marbz Diaz

the new National Church Engagement Manager at Baptist World Aid Australia

hen Marbeun Diaz was growing up in the Philippines, he spent his first ten years living in a red-light district. Surrounded by poverty and heartache, the young boy began to question, 'Where are you, God, in this dark situation?'

Now Marbuen (or as he prefers, 'Marbz') leads the Church Engagement team at Baptist World Aid Australia.

After 18 years pastoring a church, he joined the work at Baptist World Aid and in December 2020 was promoted to his new position as National Manager, overseeing a staff of five across the country. Today, with a deeply held conviction that 'God is always there - present even in dark places', Marbz' passion in service and leadership is to inspire others to see God at work where they might not otherwise.

BWA: Tell us a bit about your role and why you love being a part of Baptist World Aid.



MARBZ: I love being a part of what God is doing here – both overseas and here in Australia. As a pastor, I felt called to make disciples and that is still my calling. It is a privilege to be part of an invitation to churches in Australia to join in what God is doing in vulnerable communities overseas.

For me, the gospel is an invitation to step into empathy, and ask, 'How will God's grace respond to the situation faced by those on the margins?' It is not enough just to be accepted into God's grace; he wants us to grow in that grace.

BWA: But sometimes issues around global poverty can feel overwhelming. How do you stay hopeful?

MARBZ: Firstly, seeing the witness of my brothers and sisters overseas brings about a fire in my soul that encourages me. They lead me in my understanding of what resilience is and what faith looks like. In situations of crisis, upon crisis, or war upon war, the witness of these faithful servants will outlast any conflict. Their witness is like the Cedars of Lebanon in the Psalms.


Our supporters here in Australia also inspire hope. They don't know our brothers and sisters in these places, and yet they respond, in solidarity to loving their neighbours, with generosity. Seeing the work God is doing in his people here in Australia, seeing their generosity and God's grace at work, gives me hope.

First, pray. And then, pursue awareness.

BWA: What are some ways we can practically participate in addressing global challenges today?

MARBZ: First, pray. And then, pursue awareness. Our prayer creates a desire to understand these situations better, that understanding then deepens our care and leads us back to prayer. We don't come to God hopeless, we come with faith. When we pray, we pray believing God can and will act. When we pray, we come to understand our place in seeing God's kingdom come here on earth.
