The 2022 Baptist Family Gathering 'Swimming Against the Tide'



The Baptist Family Gathering, was held on the September 16-17 at Cornerstone Christian Fellowship, Howard Springs. This was a great venue with its Corner Café and spaces for separate 'Breakout Sessions' led by guest speakers.

Traditionally known as the 'BUNT Assembly', the name change heralded an intention by the Board Fellowship this year to make it more relational to a wider cross section of our church attendees.

Swimming Against the Tide was the title for the Gathering with the aim of 'bringing together generations to encourage, equip and empower for the cause of Christ and the extension of His kingdom.' The Gathering kicked off with a Youth event on Friday evening. Following a generous meal, Andrew Turner of Crossover shared an excellent message which impacted those present. Andrew is the author of '*Taking the Plunge*', a book on baptism, which he gave away to interested listeners.

The keynote speaker on Saturday was Dr. Brian Harris, former Principal of WA Theological College and now from the Avenir Leadership Institute. In keeping with the theme of *Swimming Against the Tide*, Brian highlighted the current 'Tide' of Me, Myself and Me, and the Self -Absorption of the present age. Further themes of Brian's were 'Praying Dangerously and 'Living As If the Kingdom is coming'. The Board and the churches are served well by Priscilla Howard who deals with administration and bookkeeping.



We spent most of our time here (at Yuendumu) familiarising ourselves further with the town, meeting local yapa (Warlpiri), including more of the believers, and some kardiya (white fellas) working with various organisations. It was a privilege for Danny to share briefly at two different church gatherings. We keep learning so much.

One highlight has been getting to know Andrew Stojanovski, who pioneered with others the *Mt Theo* program which ultimately curbed the youth petrol sniffing epidemic. We have found his book *Dog Ear Cafe* one of the most helpful descriptions of the wider challenges still involved today. Big news is that Outback team members **Mat and Shannon Anderson** and family are moving north to Kalkarindji in 2023, after 4 years based at Yuendumu. This means until we have full time people there again, we will soon be the only team members alongside the Indigenous community in Yuendumu. At the same time our rhythm of being based there for about a third of the year is starting to settle. The change will present new opportunities and challenges for all of us.

PRAISE God for the relaunch of the Bush Camps, growing relationships and momentum for our team alongside the Indigenous communities.
PRAY for more full-time people to join the Outback team, especially in

Yuendumu.

F or the first time in around 6-8 years, a combined Bush Training Camp for indigenous churches was held July 7-11, at Chilla Well, around 130 NW of Yuendumu, just off the Tanami Track. Approximately 35 representatives attended from a number of communities, including Yuendumu, Lajamanu and Ali Curung. The entire BMA Outback Team was able to be present.

The passing of two church members in days just prior to the camp meant that "Sorry Business" had to be attended to during this time, but it was really encouraging that people were committed to come in spite of this important cultural activity. The theme of the teaching was "Creation and Reconciliation", with major input from Mark Holt (Melbourne) and Mat Anderson (Yuendumu), along with Jerry Jangala (Lajamanu). passages in Genesis, 2 Corinthians and Galatians/Colossians.

Meals around smoking fires, camped out under the stars, intercultural learning, deep consideration in informal small group conversations and simple singing accompanied by guitars, free time bush tucker gathering and hunting, and barefooted children scooting through the dust, made for a richly memorable and profitable experience. Notes for further learning in the communities will be produced in coming weeks.

All in all, this was a worthwhile, and at times deeply moving camp (though not without challenges) that indigenous leaders and BMA staff agreed alike would be picked up again in 2023, possibly in two different locations at two separate times.

God at work in Katherine

K atherine Baptist Church (KBC) had been praying and advertising for a pastor to come to Katherine for 18 months. The number of people coming to worship was so small that we were sitting in a circle, so it did not seem as bad with so few in a church auditorium. This was back in May, and being quite discouraged, the Church Board and members met to pray and fully consider the future of KBC without a pastor. We made a plan to hold services until the end of the financial year.

After that meeting, that very night and to our amazement, an application came through from a pastor in South Africa. KBC soon invited Pastor Roydon and his wife, Debbie Burns to come as pastor. However, for Pastor Roydon to be able to emigrate to Katherine, we soon found that it is a slow and complicated process, for there is much to be completed with the Department of Immigration.

Meanwhile, KBC continued to meet for worship and being the dry season, there were visitors who often came to meet with us. Many of them offered encouraging words and prayers for us. Though excited that a pastor had been appointed, it was becoming increasingly more challenging for the leaders to keep going. Then in early August, the church secretary, Alice, received a phone call from Kevin Young, who was inquiring as to whether the pastor position was still available (God is never early, never late, but always on time). Alice explained that a South African pastor had been called, but an interim pastor position was available here.

God was showing His care for KBC, the leaders and the Youngs. Kevin and Christina Young knew that God was calling them 'to go and make disciples' and had left their home in Forster in NSW in February. After spending some time in Alice Springs, they headed north in their caravan after their conversations with Alice, the KBC Church secretary, the Youngs arrived in Katherine on Friday 5th August and Kevin began preaching on Sunday 7th . KBC is very blessed that Kevin and Christina are here, and we celebrate the goodness of our Heavenly Father. Kevin and Christina have no idea how long the interim period will be, yet they are faithfully serving Him. Already there have been some salvations since their arrival, some people re-dedicating their lives to Jesus, a baptism, a group for primary-aged children established and the Warlpiri Baptist Church is once again holding a Sunday night service and a Wednesday night Bible study.


Once a month **Café Church** is held at different venues where the focus is on fellowship and encouraging one another in faith and love.

IS AN INTERNSHIP FOR YOU?

"I think ministry is in my future but I'm not sure."



"I'm not sure where I'm headed but I would love some direction."

f you are asking one or more of these questions, perhaps the Internship program of Baptist Churches of South Australia (BCSA) is for you.

The internship is a leadership development pathway where people of all ages can grow their discipleship, stretch their leadership, explore their spirituality and live out an adventurous faith.

What's involved?

Interns attend modules, work alongside a leadership coach, meet regularly with a spiritual mentor and share the journey with other interns. The interns are encouraged to try new opportunities in their local church, using the framework of a personalised Learning Covenant.

Can I do the course if I live in the NT?


Yes, wherever possible modules are streamed so you can be part of this internship opportunity.

Priscilla Howard is the first in the NT to undertake the BCSA internship course. She explains what it has meant for her. "The internship is a year course which runs from March to November. There are 14 modules on Zoom (approximately every 2-3 weeks), plus this year there was a two-day structured retreat in South Australia. The best thing!

There is also the opportunity to meet regularly with a Spiritual Mentor to read the Bible and pray together, and a Leadership Coach, with whom you develop a Learning Covenant. *This is absolutely a course where you get out of it what you put into it.* I would encourage openness, honesty, and expectation of what God will do in and through you."

Priscilla's Learning Covenant has been tailored toward 'Cultural Inclusion in Worship'. Her home church of Casuarina Baptist has a multiethnic congregation, with many languages and cultures represented.



Already a member of the Worship Team at CBC, Priscilla says she now has a specific role which is to encourage the congregation to worship the Lord together in their own distinctive ways. Priscilla invites people to do the Bible reading, lead in prayer, and share songs during the service, often in their own heart language.

"For our church, it's about creating an environment that is open and inviting for people of all cultures to participate and to use their gifts and abilities unhindered." Priscilla sees her role as facilitating and coordinating, encouraging and journeying with people while building relationships. She adds, "I've experienced discouragement but you push through... and it's so richly rewarding...because of the hard work. It's constantly challenging."




Yapa and Kardiyawalking side by side
